
## CHURCH UPDATES

### Spring Cleaning for Your Financial House

It is that time of year again: Daylight Savings Time and spring are both here along with the common urge for some spring cleaning and a fresh start. In addition to organizing your closets and cupboards, a new season presents a perfect opportunity for financial spring cleaning as well, giving you the chance to take stock of your current situation, make changes as needed and prepare for an even brighter financial future.

1. **Review your credit report.** You may know that you can review your credit report for free once every year, yet many Americans fail to do so. This review gives you the chance to view your credit score, correct any mistakes on your credit report and examine your finances through this particular spotlight. If you have not reviewed your credit report already this year, visit [www.annualcreditreport.com](http://www.annualcreditreport.com).

### ***CHURCH WORLD SERVICE KITS***

---

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE KITS are an all church project and we will dedicate the CWS kits on Palm Sunday, April 9 during worship. Don't forget to include the \$2.00 postage fee for shipping the kits ... Thank you!

The annual CWS Kit Project includes items for school kits, emergency clean-up buckets and hygiene kits. If you are unable to shop, the school and hygiene kits cost \$15.00 each and the clean-up kits cost \$75.00 each. We have the school bags ready made for your use – you only have to fill them.

During 2016, there were many floods and hurricanes throughout the world, impacting Haiti, Myanmar and the United States. Hurricane Matthew, for example, arrived in the US on October 4<sup>th</sup> and was one of the worst striking storms in the past decade. Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and West Virginia were especially hit hard. Because of your generosity, CWS was able to respond quickly. You helped them provide 8,236 Emergency Cleanup Buckets, 13,980 Hygiene Kits, 3,000 School Kits and 205 wool blankets to communities affected by Hurricane Matthew.

Your help is needed now more than ever!

**CWS HYGIENE KITS** can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families in the face of natural disasters, violence, or grinding poverty. <http://cwskits.org/assemble-kits/hygiene-kits/> All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each Hygiene Kit just prior to its journey. Value: \$15; Processing fee: \$2 per Kit. **Hygiene kit supplies needed:**

<p>One hand towel measuring approximately 15"x 28" to 16"x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)</p> <p>One wide-tooth comb, removed from the package</p> <p>One fingernail or toenail clipper, removed from the package (either is acceptable)</p>	<p>One washcloth</p> <p>One bath size bar of soap in original package</p> <p>One toothbrush in the package</p> <p>Ten standard size Band-aids</p>

Value: \$15 Processing fee: \$2 per Kit. **School kits supplies needed:**

**CWS EMERGENCY CLEANUP BUCKETS** provide aid to families and communities affected by flooding, tornados and other disasters. <http://cwskits.org/assemble-kits/emergency-cleanup-buckets/> All cleaning items must be new— all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape. Value: \$75; Processing fee: \$3 per Kit. **Supplies needed:**

### HEALTH CORNER: Computers, Digital Devices and Eye Strain

Staring at your computer screen, smartphone or other digital devices for long periods won't cause permanent eye damage, but your eyes may feel dry and tired. You may develop blurry vision, fatigue or eye strain. Some people also experience headaches or motion sickness when viewing 3-D, which may indicate that the viewer has a problem with focusing or depth perception.

**What causes digital related eye strain?** Normally, humans blink about 15 times a minute, but studies show we blink half to a third that often while using computers and other digital screen devices, whether for work or play. Extended reading, writing or other intensive “near work” can also cause eye strain.

#### Eye Ergonomics Tips

- Sit about 25 inches, or arm's length, from the computer screen. Position the screen so your eye gaze is slightly downward.
- Many devices now have glass screens with considerable glare. Reduce glare by using a matte screen filter if needed.
- Take regular breaks using the “20-20-20” rule: every 20 minutes, shift your eyes to look at an object at least 20 feet away, for at least 20 seconds.
- Use artificial tears to refresh your eyes when they feel dry. Consider using a humidifier.
- If a screen is much brighter than the surrounding light, your eyes have to work harder to see. Adjust your room lighting and try increasing the contrast on your screen to reduce eye strain.

**A note to contact lens users:** Contact lenses can exacerbate eye dryness and irritation common to heavy users of computers and other digital devices often. Some tips:


- Give your eyes a break by wearing your glasses.
- Don't sleep in your contact lenses, even if they are labeled “extended wear.”
- Always use good cleaning practices.

If your eyes are consistently red, blurry or watery, or they become sensitive to light or painful, see an ophthalmologist.
